Bilitz – London and major cities Evacuation – moving children, mothers and disabled people into the countryside away from towns and cities that were bombed during the Bilitz. Rationing – the system of limiting the amount of certain goods a person could purchase. Designed to achieve equality, protect the poor and prevent hoarding. To know why we were able to win the Battle of Britain. Factories – women – before the war women were expected to be housewives or only do certain jobs. The war effort expanded this and changed the world of work forever. Teamwork – the war effort – everyone doing their part – British Values.
